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
BRIEF HISTORY OF THE HOSPITAL-

DR. HENRY ARCHAMBAULT

(EXCERPTS FROM THE BOOK "GREAT THINGS HAPPEN")

ARRIVED IN JIRAPA, OCTOBER 1954.

The operation went well, and the next day Dr. Archambault paid early morning visit to this his first patient in Jirapa. Norbert lay very still in his bed. daring to move a muscle for fear the pain of the previous day would return or the wound tear open and bleed. After him. examining the doctor told him to sit up. The sister translated this for him, but he refused to believe what he had heard. His eyes grew wide with fear and surprise. "No!", he said. beginning to tremble. But the strange doctor insisted.

Dr. Archambault's arrival at Jirapa on the evening of 22nd October 1954 was memorable. The new hospital was still several months from completion and there were no facilities as yet for performing surgical operations. Almost before he had time to put his luggage down, let alone unpack it, an acute case of strangulated hernia presented itself at the mission clinic and he was asked by the sisters to take a look at it. The patient, Mr. Norbert Moglakpiere, was in great pain. One glance at him was sufficient for the physician to know that he would have to operate quickly. In the absence of proper facilities, the old maternity delivery room would have to do. There was no equipment either, so everything had to be improvised. The linen was sterilized in an old dustbin and the instruments in a stainless steel container, both of which were heated on a charcoal fire in the open. Light was provided by kerosene lamp and a motorcycle lamp connected to a 1KV generator. Sister John assisted as nurse and anaesthetist while I held the motorcycle lamp and the patient's hand.


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Finally, he reluctantly allowed himself to be helped to a sitting position with his legs dangling over the side of the bed. He held his breath as long as he could and then let it seep out ever so slowly.



For a long time he took shallow breaths, gradually relaxing. Just when he thought the worst was over and they would allow him to lie back in the position proper to any decent sick man, the doctor and the sister began pulling him to his feet! Were they throwing him out? He would surely fall, or the wound would break open and he would die. But the arms that supported him were strong and reassuring. He took a few steps about the room with the doctor and sister on either side of him. This seemed to please them, enough at least to win their permission to return to his bed. The same thing happened later in the day and again the following day. And on the third day he was up walking normally and ready to be discharged from the hospital.

This was something unheard of. Word spread rapidly that a new kind of doctor had arrived in Jirapa, a wonder worker who operates and gets patients up the same day and sends them home cured in three days.

Doctor "**Shambo**", as the people affectionately called him, was one of God's great gifts to Ghana. His reverence for life extended beyond the merely physical to the whole person - body, mind and soul.



In many instances, his surgical skills seemed secondary to his ability heal by love and concern for his patients. He had seen many cases during his practice in Detroit of persons whose physical illness were only symptoms of a deeper psychological or spiritual problems. Even among the apparently healthy, he was often struck by the pitiable insufficiency of their soul growth in proportion to their physical development. The same could be said of his intellectual acquaintances who were so learned and clever in matters of the world and science, yet often so stunted in the spiritual part of their being. How strange to see these unevenly developed people, so far from being the whole persons they were capable of becoming and meant to become. For that reason, God was never absent from his mind when he treated his patients in Jirapa. He took a personal interest in each of them, visiting them twice daily and lifting their spirits with a few cheerful words in their own language. When he thought they needed it, he did not hesitate to speak to them of God's love for them and to encourage them to pray, to trust in Him. The language barrier sometimes interfered, but in that case he would be concerned to find someone who could do it for him.

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT TEAM

On behalf of hospital management team, I greet you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ and introduce you to the second edition of our "The Worker Journal", which spans a period from September to November of 2023.

The hospital has been dedicated in our service to the community and our commitment to organising free quarterly school health screening. Within the period under review, we visited St. Agnes JHS and St. Francis JHS for the above mentioned exercise.

In collaboration with Emerald foundation, the hospital offered free breast screening and counselling for security personnel within the Jirapa Municipality, including Ghana Police Service, Fire Service, Customs and Immigration, Ghana National Ambulance et cetera, during the breast cancer awareness month. The opening of our new hospital canteen took place in November this year with serving of both local and continental dishes.

Lightwave health information management system has come to stay with further digitization of our service by the introduction of plastic bar-coded patient ID card and real time printed out bills at both billing units and GCB onsite banking points. Our commitment to regular in-service training for staff has not wavered. Within the period under review training was done on Obstetric triaging, blood transfusion ethics, TB case management, registration of babies on LHIMS.

Our NICU mothers' hostel (Robin's baby nest) has been renovated for the comfort of our nursing mothers. Doctors of Africa, our foreign partners from the Netherlands, fulfilled their second visit in October this year to offer free urological surgeries.

We thank God for his goodness and mercy which abound, and appreciate our diligent staff for working around the clock to provide excellent services to our cherished client.



As one of the objectives which seeks to promote and increase service coverage, the Specialty Units in the St. Joseph hospital, Jirapa usually embark on community outreach programs on quarterly bases to selected schools and communities. On the 20th of July, 2023 and 2nd day of November, 2023, a Team made up of Health promotion officers, Dental technician, Psychiatry Nurses, Eye Nurses, Ear, Nose and Throat Nurse and Physiotherapy Technicians visited the St. Agnes and St. Francis Junior High Schools respectively to render a comprehensive specialized health care services to the students and teachers.

Among the services provided during the outreach were; general physical examination, oral/mouth examination, eye examination and screening. Health talks were equally delivered on oral hygiene and substance abuse to create awareness about the potential effects on health, school attendance and performance.

The main objectives of this service is the prevention of illness as well as the promotion of health and well-being of the students through:

- Early detection and care of students with health problems
- Development of healthy attitudes and healthy behaviors by students
- Ensure a healthy environment for children at school
- Prevention of communicable diseases at school



RENOVATION OF NICU MOTHERS' HOSTEL

The mothers' hostel was constructed in the year 2015 as a result of the vision of Mrs. Robins, a member of Dr. Godfrey Bacheyie's Canadian team. Mrs. Robins saw the need for a place of abode for mothers of babies admitted at the NICU as they will have to cater for these babies during their stay.



She decided to solicit for funds for its construction. The mothers' hostel has been named after her as form of appreciation for her dedication towards the wellbeing of neonates.



UPDATE ON LIGHTWAVE HEALTH INFORMATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The hospital has complimented the Lightwave health information management system (LHIMS) by providing plastic barcoded patient ID cards in replacement of paper ID cards.



On the other hand, the billing unit has also been provided with printers (Epson) at both billing units to enable them print out bills for all payment services in the hospital.





OBSTETRICS TRIAGING

This program is being rolled out to include other high-volume hospital (St. Joseph's Hospital, Jirapa) with training of core staff on concept/history of OTIP/MEOWS, overview of OTIP/MEOWS program, triaging processes, establishment of a triage area, and effective communication, held on 17th – 20th October, 2023.

LHIMS BABY REGISTRATION

The baby's registration on the LHIMS serves as a medium for which new born babies are enrolled into the LHIMS system aging from 6weeks and above. This registration entails information about the baby i.e. baby's name, vital signs, history of delivery immunization etc.



TB MANAGEMENT TRAINING



TB management is also an activity that was organized to train health worker (Physicians) by District Health Directorate (DHA)involving in detecting cases of and managing patients and with drug-resistant. The hospital has a ward that admit TB case for management and has a molecular machine for detecting TB cases among others.

IPC TRAINING FOR ALL NEWLY RECRUITED STAFF (2022-2023)

The training is designed to enhance the skills of this group of personnel who did not receive a similar organized training before their recruitment.





Globally, the month of October each is year designated for the creation of awareness on breast cancer. In view of this, October was characterized by several health education activities to drum home key messages about this preventable/curable cancer if detected early but deadly if treatment is delayed due to late detection.



One of the iconic activities organized was the breast cancer screening exercise for the various security services in the Jirapa Municipality. In attendance to the exercise were personnel from the police service, Fire Service, Immigration Service and Ghana National Ambulance Service to have their breast examined.

The exercise came to being under the auspices of Emerald Foundation in partnership with St. Joseph Hospital, Jirapa.

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


GERMAN UROLOGIST



With perseverance and commitment, she combined education and work. She completed her State Registered Nurse (SRN) course in 1993 at the Jirapa Nursing Training College. Due to her intolerance for laziness and indiscipline at the workplace, she is always known and remembered as a disciplinarian by her colleagues and subordinates. Mama Maggi says her overreaction to issues is a big challenge to her and wishes to improve upon that. She says the biggest challenge she has ever faced in life is leaving her children behind with her husband to further her education when they were still young. Mama Maggi says her failure in life is she not being able to climb the academic ladder as she wished but will amend that by supporting her children to pursue high education. However, her biggest achievement is being able to climb an academic ladder at the age of 45 despite advice from friends and relatives to rather invest those monies into her children's education. She says she plans to go into small-sized business and take care of her grandchildren after retirement from active service.

She says despite numerous children at home, her mother always had time for each of them no matter how busy she was. It her mother's guidance and advice that has brought her up to this level. Mama Maggi always have an advice for young nurses. She always advice these young nurses to develop passion but not just come into the profession for monetary gains. She has also advised these nurses to develop some relationships with their patients and relatives as this may help them achieve goal of providing health care. She also advice nurses to update themselves on strange conditions they encounter at the wards.

Mama Maggi is one of the longest serving staff of the hospital and was recently recognized by management for her commitment and dedication to the course of the hospital.





The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) of St. Joseph Catholic Hospital, Jirapa, was started in 2015. It is a special unit where preterm and sick babies are received, with a dedicated team of midwives, nurses and Doctors. As a result of the team work, discipline and result-oriented attitude of staff at the unit, there has been an over fifty percent decline in neonatal deaths, from double digits to single digits, over the past three years. The unit was awarded the best ward in the 2022 end of year staff awards. The unit is known to be a life changer and most staff who pass through the unit in the course of yearly rotation gain a positive attitude towards work. Evident to this, the overall best nurse in the Upper West Region for 2022, Ms. Alifa Zakari, was a staff from the unit. Over the years, the unit has improved in its equipment inventory but prays for more modern equipment to facilitate their work outcome. Currently they have the following equipments used to care for premature and sick newborn babies; Neonatal incubators, Radiant Warmers, Continuous Positive Airway Pressure(CPAP).

Activities such as feeding of babies to keep them strong and healthy as well as daily health education is usually carried out to the mothers and care givers on how to keep their babies healthy and strong. NICU is proud to have survived a lot of preterm and critically ill babies, hereby putting smiles on the faces of parents within the municipality and beyond.






